Stop the killing. Fight for the living.

Somewhere in Canada today a worker will die on the job. Others will succumb to a work-related disease – COVID-19 included. Thousands more will suffer an injury that will be permanent and life-altering. This is unacceptable. For those who care, we know these workers to be mothers, fathers, sisters, brothers, children, and friends who are as close as any family we are born into. **They are not impersonal statistics.**

Preventing worker suffering and pursuing occupational health and safety (OHS) excellence involves much more than chasing paper, completing checklists, and cashing rebate cheques. Real OHS programs protect all workers, no matter their employment status or where they work.

Superior prevention programs begin by:

- ◆ protecting the most vulnerable
- ◆ controlling workplace hazards, not worker behaviours
- ◆ promoting physical and psychological worker well-being
- ◆ taking every reasonable precaution to safeguard workers and their OHS rights
- ◆ implementing quality health and safety training with these aims foremost in mind
- ◆ recognizing when we properly protect workers, we protect community and ecological health too.

This is what workplace health and safety justice looks like. In its absence, we need fair workers' compensation, vigorous enforcement of health and safety laws and when necessary, consistent Criminal Code prosecutions, first made possible by the Westray Bill and worker health and safety activism.
