## **2025 WHSC Annual Student** Scholarship Contest in support of safer, healthier work



## **2025 RULES**

Awards	The top applicant (regardless of medium) will be awarded the Clifford Pilkey, WHSC Founder Memorial Scholarship and receive \$6,000.
	The second-place applicant (regardless of medium) will be awarded the Fred Upshaw, Champion for Social Justice Memorial Scholarship and receive \$4,000.
	Up to two additional successful applicants in each medium category will receive \$2,000 each.
Eligibility*	Any full-time high school student residing in Ontario and beginning, in fall 2025, their first year in full-time or part- time studies leading to a diploma, certificate or degree from any publicly funded Ontario college or university. (Applications from students having graduated prior to summer 2024 will not be accepted.)
	Immediate family members of a WHSC employee are not eligible. Immediate family member includes child, stepchild, niece, nephew, grandchild and sibling.
Application	Applicants may enter the contest only as an individual (no team entries). Each applicant must submit:
	a completed application form*
	<ul> <li>a description of your volunteer activities showing how you are helping to improve the lived experiences of your fellow students and/or community members</li> </ul>
	a letter of recommendation from a teacher, school administrator or representative of a recognized community organization
	a signed consent and release form
	an essay, poster, or video addressing the topic and meeting the criteria outlined below.
	Only one submission per applicant will be accepted. More specifically, you must choose to submit an essay, poster, OR video.
	Submission must not violate privacy, intellectual property, or copyright laws.
Торіс	SPEAK UP! Act on your rights to safe and healthy work.
	The myth of young worker carelessness is a false narrative. Research evidence and the experiences of workers tell us being new to work or new to a task, and not age, raises the likelihood of suffering an injury compared to others with more experience. The reasons newness places workers in harm's way are many, ranging from inexperience with work processes and equipment to lack of awareness about workplace hazards, lack of competent supervision and/or fear of reporting concerns to a supervisor.
	Employers and supervisors have the most significant legal obligations to protect workers. Though workers themselves have legal rights under the <i>Occupational Health and Safety Act</i> they can act on to help pursue safer, healthier work. Examples of these rights include the right to know about workplace hazards, to refuse unsafe and unhealthy work, to access occupational health and safety training, and to not face repercussions should you act on your rights. Workers also have the right to participate in the pursuit of safer, healthier work, best exercised through worker representatives to joint health and safety committees or individual worker health and safety representatives in smaller workplaces.
	Why is it that employers and supervisors have the most significant responsibilities to protect workers? And why is it important for workers to insist on their legal rights in pursuit of safer, healthier work? Please also explain and explore the connections between these responsibilities and rights.
	Submissions must be the original work of the applicant.

Video Criteria	No more than three minutes in length.
	Upload the video to <b>WeTransfer</b> ( <u>https://wetransfer.com</u> ) — email to swarden@whsc.on.ca. Include a note of this in your email submission with the remaining required documents. Ensure the file is the exact name listed on the application form. If the video is not accessible and downloadable the submission will not be accepted. Do not place your name in the video credits. (Should your submission receive an award and we choose to shar the video on social media, you can add your name subsequently.)
Poster Criteria	The minimum poster size must be 8.5" by 11".
	Must demonstrate a visual art skill, combining either illustration, painting or computer-generated art with graphic design.
	Applicants should keep in mind artwork may be reproduced and full-colour artwork is preferred. Do not sign your artwork. (Should your submission receive an award, and we choose to display it, you can add your name subsequently.)
Essay Rules	Essays must be a minimum of 600 words and a maximum of 1,000 words. All pages must be numbered. Place correct word count at the end of the document. The document must be word processed in a 12-point font and double-spaced. Do not place your name on any page of the essay. (Should we publish the essay in whole or in part we will include your name then.) Essays must include a bibliography.
Judging Criteria	WHSC will select a panel of judges to judge the contest using the following criteria. The decisions of the panel with respect to the winning applicants are final and not open to dispute.
	All entries that meet eligibility requirements will be judged on the following criteria:

	Overall Criteria for all applicants Final scores will be based on the weighted average of their video, poster, or essay submission (75 per cent) an their efforts helping to improve the lived experiences of fellow students and/or community members (25 per cent).
